

One of the ways of using technology in the classroom is to have students take some of their quizzes online. Students love quizzes that are self-checking. It's a nice change of pace! After a lot of experimenting with different sites, here are the best sites I can recommend:

1) **FunBrain.com**

This is an amazing and comprehensive site. Go to Quiz Lab and register your own ID and password. You can use other people's quizzes and/or create your own. Editing your quizzes is also very simple. You also have the capability of adding links to your own site, having a calendar of events, and much more. Student results can be e-mailed to you. Once you get your site established at Fun Brain (and it's easy), your students can log on to your site and take your quizzes, etc. By the way, in my opinion, this site is a lot easier to use than Course Info.

2) **Quiz Creator Cool Tool by Charity Kahn**

If you already have your own web page and you don't know JavaScript (which is the language most often used to create neat features like self-checking quizzes, etc.), here is a site where you can create your own quizzes and then get the script to put right on your web page. You have several choices of how you want your answers displayed and the student gets a percentage score. This quiz creator was made by a former math teacher.

3) **Kelly's Multiple Choice Quiz Generator**
